

#### **6 – Comments:**

Austria does not seem to have a national law that regulates outdoor leisure activities.

A programme safety scheme is not available either. Regional authorities (e.g. Land Tirol) however tend to regulate certain activities in terms of vocational training.

The Austrian approach does not focus on sectoral safety measures.

The domains of Environment and Equipment seem to be left over entirely to the various conventions and standards (ISO & CEN) that apply throughout Europe.

Probably due to its geography, the safety measures available where mainly found in activities of the Snow, the Earth and the Stream sub-sectors.

The level of safety input in the outdoors is more regional and local, organized per activity and based around the components of staff training and customers' information in a case-by-case approach.

The overall effectiveness of measures related to safety of outdoor leisure activities in Austria corresponds to pattern N°3.
